Dear Craig,

I refer to the requests which you have made under the Freedom of Information Act 2014 for access to records held by this Department, as follows:

## FOI/Reg/2020/189

A copy of all correspondences (including any attachments therein) from any member of RTE's executive board and the Minister (and/or his advisors/ department officials) in relation to state funding, the TV license, and/or general RTE's financial matters, to cover the period Jan 1, 2020, to date.

## FOI/Req/2020/194

- A copy of any briefing documents compiled for the Minister in preparation of the RTE meetings listed in the reference below.
- A copy of any minutes, notes, memos, etc from RTE meetings with the Minister listed in the reference below.
- A copy of any communications (internal or external) arising from the meetings listed in the reference below.

With regard to FOI request FOI/Req/2020/189, the Department of Foreign Affairs holds no records that fall under the scope of this request.

With regard to FOI request FOI/Req/2020/194, the Department of Foreign Affairs does have records that fall under the scope of this request and these records are listed in the attached schedule.

I have made a decision to part grant access to these records as follows:

Records refused/part-granted under Section 37 of the Act – Personal Information While Section 37 (1) is a mandatory exemption, I am still obliged to consider whether the public interest would be best served by releasing the records in full. I have taken into account the benefit to the public to be given access to correspondence in a manner which demonstrates transparency and accountability of the Department. In the main, the refusal of access or part-grant records is due to those records relating to personal identifiable information and much of it does not affect the substance of the record. I have particularly considered whether releasing the personal information would provide any additional benefit in this regard. I have weighed this against the right of individuals to have their personal information remain private and have found that there is a clear prerogative for this information to remain private.

## Right of Appeal

Should you wish to appeal this decision, you may do so in writing to the Freedom of Information Unit, Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, 76-78 Harcourt Street, Dublin 2 or by email to <u>foi@dfa.ie</u>. A fee applies for an appeal for access to non-personal information; the level of this fee has been set at €30. For methods of payment, please contact FOI Unit at <u>foi@dfa.ie</u> or 01-4082857.

You should make your appeal within 4 weeks (20 working days) from the date of this notification. However, the making of a late appeal may be permitted in appropriate circumstances. The appeal will involve a complete reconsideration of the matter by a more senior member of the staff of this Department.
